An Old Firm

A^S a young boy, I always had a liking for the "thin English" matzot which was baked with wood fuel. This delightful product was manufactured by a famous old established concern, Levy Bros., of Middlesex Street, London. The firm began operations in 1710 and continued to work even after the introduction, some sixty years ago, of machinery for the baking of matzot. The firm was the last of the bakers of this type of thin matzot.

I remember that Levy Bros. received the honour of acceptance of their matzot by members of the Royal Family and consignments were sent regularly to many parts of the world. During the Great War the firm supplied matzot to the Jewish soldiers at the front.

Supplies used to come to this country and were ordered by English-Jewish families who had come to reside in South Africa. During last Passover no English thin matzot could be secured here, and now I learn that the famous concern of Levy Bros. has just been closed. The demand for the matzot baked with wood fuel had apparently diminished in the last decade or so to such an extent as to cause it to become an unmarketable commodity.

A Synagogue is Rebuilt

THE news that the community of Kruschow, in Moravia, is rebuilding the synagogue, which the Nazis recently destroyed, will come as a surprise to many. One may well appreciate the feelings of our coreligionists, and their confidence in a brighter future. The appeal for funds which this community issued says: "Let the enemies burn our synagogues. So long as there is any strength left in us, we shall rebuild them." According to the report, the sum necessary for the restoration of the synagogue was collected within two hours and building activities are already in process.

Up to the middle of June, twenty-three synagogues had been burned by the Nazis in Czecho-Slovakia, and one hundred and forty Sefer Torahs were reduced to ashes. Smaller communities in Czecho-Slovakia have transported their scrolls to Prague, where there is a greater feeling of security. Yet, despite all this, Kruschow insists on rebuilding its House of God. Here one is truly faced with an act of herosim and courage before which the blustering speeches of tyrants fade into insignificance.

Bloch's Concerto

I WAS interested to learn that a recording of the Bloch Violin Concerto has now been issued by the Columbia Gramophone Company. This publication is regarded as a great event in musical circles and Desmond Shawe-Taylor describes it as "the most valuable piece of pioneer work performed by the gramophone since Decca published the Walton Symphony."

The Concerto is produced on four records and the soloist is Szigeti, whose recent visit to this country is so well remembered. He is accompanied by the Paris Conservatoire Orchestra which is conducted by Charles Munch. Szigeti, by the way, performed this Concerto at its premiere in Cleveland. At the beginning of this year he played it with Sir Thomas Beecham at the Queen's Hall, and musical critics were full of praise for Bloch's composition.

The composition is described as "music of conflict" and it reaches great heights of genius. Bloch himself has warned the musical public against seeking in the Concerto evidence of any specifically Jewish inspiration such as is to be found in most of his compositions. Nevertheless, musical critics assert that they are well able to discern the Oriental note and the pathos of a distant past.

I hope that the Concerto will before long be performed by some of our orchestras, or that at least the recording will be broadcast from the wireless stations of this country.

Silence
