GERALD CASSEN'S VOCAL RECITAL

Fine Performance at Johannesburg Musical Society

Songs ranging from Carissimi and Caccini, the sixteenth century Italian composers, to the English contemporary writers, Arnold Bax, Stanford and Frank Bridge, were included in the programme presented by Gerald Cassen, the South African bass singer, at a recital given by him for the Johannesburg Musical Society at the Selborne Hall, on Monday night. He was assisted by Gertrude Hunt and Suzanne Margolis, whose contribution to the evening's pleasure took the anusual form of pianoforte duets.


Mr. Cassen is well-known to concert-goers in Johannesburg, and those qualities in his singing to which they eagerly look forward in a recital by him were well to the fore on Monday night. The richness and resonance of his voice, his effortless control of technical difficulties, and his gift for dramatic interpretation were all given ample opportunity in the groups of songs chosen by him. The charming lyricism of Caccini's "Amarilli," the emotional intensity of "When the King Went to War" (Koeneman), and the austerity and restraint of "The White Peace" (Bax) were effectively brought out by Mr. Cassen, who possesses a particularly sensitive awareness of the composer's intention.

Two duets by Schubert — Grand Rordeau in A Major, and Fantaisie in F Minor — were played by Gertrude Hunt and Suzanne Margolis. Though not intrinsically interesting, the first work was competently executed by these talented pianists, and the second, with its many moments of real melodic beauty, was delightfully performed.

Suzanne Margolis, as accompanist to Gerald Cassen, most admirably satisfied the exacting demands made on her by the varied nature of the accompaniments.
