My mother's grandfather came from Zager, and he then went to live in Shavel. My mother remembers him telling her all about the old fellow. My grandfather lived in Robertson, and there are many Surinamers who spell their name Surinamer.

Functions In Johannesburg And Cape Town

Goodwill Week has just been observed in Cape Town. It was inaugurated on Sunday, 17th May, when Sir Herbert Stanley presided over a Citizen Meeting in the Town Hall. Prayers were offered by Bishop Lavis, Rev. F. J. B. Malan and the Rev. G. Nicolson.

A MASSED non-European choir from St. Paul's School took part in the service and addresses were delivered by Professor A. C. Cilliers, Rabbi Israel Abrahams and Dr. S. H. Skaife. On Monday, the 18th inst., the Society of Jews and Christians of Cape Town held a Symposium.

At the Rondebosch Congregational Church Rabbi Abrahams addressed the Young People's Fellowship. Throughout the week the children in the Peninsula heard over the air goodwill talks as part of the regular broadcast to schools. The broadcast programme was opened on Monday by his Hon, the Administrator of the Transyaal, who, speaking in Afriby his Hon. the Administrator of the Transvaal, who, speaking in Afrikaans, laid emphasis on each child's ability to co-operate actively in making goodwill an actuality. His message was followed in English by that of Capt. F. A. Joubert, the Administrator of the Cape, who said:

"In South Africa we are not a united nation. There is much suspicion and much distrust between the different sections of our South African population. It will be our proud task and duty to build up a finer, happier world."

IN connection with Goodwill Week, In connection with Goodwill Week, Dr. James Dexter Taylor addressed the League of Nations Union in Johannesburg on the History of the Goodwill Movement. "What is required to-day," urged Dr. Taylor, "is not only the spirit of goodwill, but its practical application." In refuting current allegations against the Jewish War Effort, Dr. Taylor gave some facts to contradict the anti-Semitic talk often heard about the part played by Jews in the war.

rhere were from 7,500 to 8,000 Jews in the Union's armed forces, 8 per cent. of the Jewish population, the percentage in the Army for the rest of the population being between 8 per cent. and 9 per cent., very much the same. Nearly 5,000 Jews are in the combatant forces, and 3,000 are now in the north. Jews have gained 13 awards for bravery, including two Military Medals.
