WAR-TIME CONCERT BY THE
PALESTINE ORCHESTRAMissing South African Airman's
Impressions

NEWS has just been received by Mr. and Mrs. I. Carnovski, of Page Street, Yeoville, Johannesburg, that their son, Lieut. Len. A. Carnovski, who is an observer in the S.A.A.F., has been reported missing after a flying battle near Sidi Barani. His family recently received several very fine letters from Lieut. Carnovski, glowingly describing a visit he paid to Palestine during a brief period of leave.

Lieut. Carnovski vividly depicts the vibrant new life that has grown up in the Jewish Homeland and offers some interesting impressions of a war-time concert of the famous Palestine Symphony Orchestra.

"I was amazed and thrilled by the almost awe-inspiring scene that met my eye," he writes. "The auditorium appeared in a setting of infinite beauty—one looks across the valley of the Wilderness of Judea to the Dead Sea and the mountains of Gilboah in Transjordan in the distance; it is truly a sight that has to be seen to be believed, it filled me with a feeling of infinite joy. Once the Orchestra started playing, that scene—with the setting sun playing elfish tricks on the hills of Judea (one seemed to see the whole rainbow of colours playing about the hills)—with the cool, clear evening air and the magic music, put me in a seventh heaven of delight. I shall not easily forget those wonderful moments—truly life was worth living then!

"The audience, too, amazed me—it consisted of all types of people, rich and poor, chalutzim, soldiers, sailors, airmen and nurses packed that magnificent place to overflowing, and everyone seemed to revel in the music, and drink it in. The Orchestra played in shirt sleeves, and that seemed to me to be symbolical of the new Palestine—realist, hard-working, but cultured and civilised to the backbone. When I set off to get back to Jerusalem, I saw another sight that showed me the new spirit of Palestine—all that huge audience were not wildly rushing around trying to scramble on to the buses, but were queuing up in an orderly fashion and waiting their turn without any fuss and bother, and there was nobody there to supervise them. I was later to see this amazing sight everywhere, everyone queues up for their buses in Palestine—except the Arabs, of course. What an orderly people!"
