DR. SAMUELSDORFF ENTERTAINED

Addressing the gathering on the subject of the war work of the Jewish women in Palestine, Dr. Samuelsdorff said that the Wizo had recognised that women must be trained in order to become free, and through the spirit and drive of Wizo, there had arisen a pioneer type of woman in Palestine with qualities which stood her in good stead now that a supreme effort had to be made for winning the war. To-day the Jewish women of Palestine took their part in every branch of war work, even helping the Home Guard, and their ability, zeal and devotion ought to serve as a source of pride to Jewry.

"FALASHA JEWS OF ABYSSINIA"

Address by Dr. Lewis Bato

An address outling the mode of life led by the Falasha Jews of Abyssinia was given on Friday last at the Carlton Hotel by Dr. Lewis Bato, who was the guest at the weekly luncheon organised by the Johannesburg Zionist Association. Dr. A. Broido presided.

Dr. Bato said that the Falasha Jews were convinced that they were the direct descendants of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. The Five Books of Moses were the main pivot of their belief and they knew nothing of the Talmud. Abyssinian was their language and they only used a few words of Hebrew.

Dr. Bato added that no stranger was allowed to go to the religious services of the Falasha Jews. The Sabbath was observed strictly and Sabbath bread was distributed among the worshippers.

"Until recently," added Dr. Bato, "these people practised sacrifices, but under the influence of Dr. Faitelowitz, who has taken a great interest in educating them, such practice has been done away with."

The family life of the Falasha Jews was dignified, patriarchal and noble. There was no "problem" of inter-marriage, because they only married among themselves.

The speaker added that the number of Falasha Jews had decreased from 100,000 some years ago to 60,000 to-day. The word "Falasha" meant "stranger" or "exile." Falasha Jews were filled with the hope of returning to Eretz Israel.

The speaker at to-day's luncheon is Mr. G. Seubring, F.R.G.S., who will talk on "Jewish Influence on Matters Spiritual and Intellectual."
