Sium Hatorah at Wynberg.

The first function to be held in the Wynberg Communal Hall since its official opening was a Sium Hatorah which was celebrated on Wednesday, 25th August, the Torah having been presented by Mr. and Mrs. J. Freedman.

There was a gathering of about 600 people from all over the Peninsula, over whom Mr. S. M. Kaplan presided.

Rev. Ch. Gordon explained the significance of the occasion, after which almost everyone in the hall inscribed a letter in the Torah. As a result over £200 was realised, and this will be a valuable addition to the funds of the Communal Hall.

The host, Mr. J. Freedman, was appointed Hagboh, and Mr. W. Freedman, Glellah. The honour of placing the cover on the newly-inscribed Torah was given to Mrs. Freedman, and that of placing the Silver Crown to Mrs. J. Freedman.

The impressive ceremony was conducted by Cantor G. Golub, at the conclusion of which a stately procession of all those present led by Mr. Freedman, carrying the Torah, proceeded to the Synagogue, where they were met by eight prominent Peninsula Rabbis, each carrying a Sofer Torah. With due ceremonial, all Torahs were placed in the Ark, and the celebrants returned to the Communal Hall where a reception was held.

Speeches were delivered by Rev. Ch. Gordon, Rabbi Gravitzky, Rabbi Morgenstern, Rabbi Bornstein (of Palestine) and Mr. S. M. Kaplan.

Replying as host, Mr. J. Freedman thanked all for their attendance, for which he was honoured. He particularly thanked Mr. W. Freedman for presenting to him (Mr. J. Freedman) the Sefer Torah which had been presented to the Congregation and inscribed that day.

Mr. J. Freedman then presented to the Congregation an enlarged photograph of Mr. S. M. Kaplan, to be placed in the office of the Synagogue. It was, said Mr. Freedman, a token of recognition of the good work done by Mr. Kaplan for the Community, and of appreciation of his services as Chairman of the Wynberg Congregation. He also presented to Mr. Kaplan a life membership certificate of the S.A. Jewish Board of Deputies which had been received from Johannesburg.

Mr. H. Dubow announced that the names of Mr. and Mrs. J. Freedman were being inscribed, by the guests, in the Golden Book.

During the reception musical items were rendered by Cantor G. Golub and Cantor H. Katzin, and were much appreciated.

A memorable occasion terminated with Hatikvah and the National Anthem.

Local music-lovers are fortunate in hearing another international celebrity so soon after the Elman concerts. It is time we had a new piano, however- Mr. Hambourg seemed not quite at ease upon the present instrument at the beginning of the Appassionata." M.

CAPE ZIONIST YOUTH EXECUTIVE.

Youth J.N.F. Conversazione. Dr. H. W. Altschul, in addressing a well attended Youth J.N.F. Conversazione held at the Zionist Hall on Sunday night, the 29th August, 1937, dealt with the "Future of the J.N.F." Condemning the prevalence of non-commitalness, Dr. Altschul proceeded to discuss the present and visualise the future. As far as the inner conceptions of the Keren Kayemeth LeYisrael are concerned its aim for the future is to obtain by purchase or gift all the land comprised within the ancient borders of Eretz Israel and to hold it as inalienable till it could be handed over to the future Jewish State to be held as inalienable State domain.

At the moment out of 50 million dunams of land in Palestine (including Tarnsjordan) the total Jewish holding is about 1½ million dunam, and of that the J.N.F. possesses about one third. Referring to Partition Dr. Altschul said that it behoved the S.A. Jewish Youth to gather their forces to fight against it. In the discussion which followed the following participated: Messrs. M. Shevelev, R. Kotlowitz, S. Rechtman, and G. Gitlin. The Misses Myrtle Kaplan and Doreen Meyers provided items which were appreciated by the gathering.
