Next Monday's Chamber Concert.

The fourth of the series of Chamber Concerts organised by Jose Rodriguez-Lopez in collaboration with Madame Anny Lambrechts and Editha Braham, will be given on Monday next (September 11th), at 8.30 p.m., in Electricity House, Strand Street. The programme to be presented should induce all Cape Town music lovers to fill the hall to capacity.

For the first time in Cape Town Madame Anny Lambrechts will present the song cycle "Chanson de Bilitis," by the great French composer Debussy, and also the complete set of 7 Spanish folk-songs by Manuel de Falla.

Jose Rodriguez-Lopez and Editha Braham will give a request performance of Cesar Franck's well-known sonata for piano and violin.

Another first performance for South Africa will be the sonata for violin and piano by Joachim Turina.

Richard Tauber's Concert.

A crowded City Hall greeted Richard Tauber last Friday night, when he gave the first recital of his second Union tour.

With a spontaneous gesture he opened with "Land of Hope and Glory," and after the first verse, the house sang with him.

Two attractive operatic arias followed, "Adieu Mignon" and "Vainement ma Bien Ainee" from Lalo's "Le Roi d'Ys."

Before the interval he sang a group of songs consisting of: "Widming" and "Die beiden Grenadiers," by Schumann, and two songs by Greig, "Am Schonsten Sommer Abend War's" and "Eros".

Outstanding amongst these was his in-

terpretation of "Two Grenadiers," sung with softened closing bars, and brought gently to a finish by the notes of the piano alone.

After the interval Tauber gave his audience a selection of songs which the films have popularised including a Strauss waltz, and of course, "You Are My Heart's Delight" and as an encore "Keep Smiling."

His charming stage presence and friendly manner made him at one with his audience.

He was assisted by the young South African 'cellist, Aubrey Rainer, who deserved the enthusiastic applause accorded him.

Last but not least, the house paid generous tribute to Tauber's accompanist, Percy Kahn, to whom much of the success of the evening was due.
