Richard Crooks.

TRIUMPH AT FIRST CONCERT.

Richard Crooks, the famous tenor of the Metropolitan Opera House, New York, scored a great triumph at his first concert in Cape Town before a tremendous audience in the City Hall on Tuesday night.

The programme was of a very wide range and gave Crooks the opportunity of displaying his genius and versatility to the greatest advantage. He has a magnificent voice, wonderful technical control, perfect diction and outstanding personality, and was in complete accord with his audience from the very first note he sang.

The concert opened with a group of Handel songs—"Where'er you walk," from "Semele"; "Alma Mia," from "Floridante"; "Sound an Alarm," from "Judas Maccabaeus"—in which Crooks revealed himself as a perfect oratorio singer. The second group consisted of "To the Children" (Rachmaninoff), "The Nightingale and the Rose" (Rimsky-Korsakov), "None but the Lonely Heart" (Tschaikowsky), and Spanish serenade (Carnevali). After the interval Richard Crooks sang Aria from "Werther" (Massenet) and "E Lucevan le Stelle" from "Tosca" (Puccini) and a group of songs consisting of Schubert's "Serenade," the delightful "Clorinda" by Morgan, "Do not go, my Love" by Hageman, and "Neapolitan Love Song" by Victor Herbert.

After each item Richard Crooks received a great ovation and he responded generously with encores, amongst which were "Now Sleeps the Crimson Petal," "Oh, Sweet Mystery of Life," "Old Mother Hubbard," and other favourites.

Frederick Schauwecker, who played the accompaniments to Crooks' singing in a most able and sympathetic manner, also contributed several solo items to the programme which were very well received.

Richard Crooks will give his second concert at the City Hall on Monday next.
