tive undertaking, so it remains our most durable asset. Not only is it to be re-garded in terms of the living needs of our people, but also in terms of our political strength when the day of reckoning will come after the war. In a realistic world the most realistic support of our claims to Eretz Israel will be not only the strong urgings by Jewish communities in the Diaspora and the goodwill of our Gentile friends, but our numbers and influence in Palestine, the amount of land there in our possession and its strategic location. Yet, while other peoples are already planning ahead for when victory shall be won, we, whose need will then be more desperately acute than that of any other, are all too prone to take as our watchword-rester dans la vague, not to plan beyond the day. How are we preparing for the masses of our people, enslaved to-day in Nazi Europe, who will flock to Eretz Israel after the war? What practical credentials are we creating to fortify our moral and historic claims to Eretz Israel when the Palestine issue shall come before the statesmen of the post-war world for solution? To "expand the place of our abode and strengthen our stakes," by making ours every dunam of land that can be bought, is transparently an elemental duty, if we are to be ready when our hour strikes.


