Mrs. Lieberman stated that victory at the end of the war would not solve our problem. There would be Jews homeless all over the world and their only haven would be Palestine. There was sufficient land to be bought in Palestine now and Jewry should not let this golden opportunity pass.

Mr. Levin pointed out that Palestine was of the utmost strategic importance in the war and it was necessary to have a strong Palestine. To-day Palestine was fairly strong—due to the work of the Jews and not of the Arabs. Palestine was able to help feed the British army as well as its own population. Since the war industry in Palestine had changed, and numerous new industries were being started. We need land in Palestine for security, for settling the homeless, for cultivation and to help industries. We must acquire as much land as possible, so that we can show a strong Palestine at the end of the war.

During the evening the Chairlady presented a Golden Book certificate to Mrs. Tocker, during whose period as Chairlady the J.N.F. quota of the Branch was exceeded.

The musical items were supplied by Miss R. Rabinowitz, who rendered two delightful pianoforte solos, and Miss Hilsenrath who accompanied by Miss N. Bloch gave four Jewish folk-songs. These were enthusiastically received.

After tea had been served, Mr. Shattenstein proposed a vote of thanks to the speakers, the artists and the host and hostess for their kind hospitality.
