

Scopus Club Luncheon.

Rev. P. H. SITTERS ON YUGOSLAVIA.

The Rev. P. H. Sitters, of the Yugoslav Y.M.C.A., was the guest-speaker at the Scopus Club Luncheon at the Del Monico on Wednesday.

Mr. Sitters who was chaplain to the British Legation at Belgrade until Yugoslavia was over-run by Germany, said that after seventeen years' experience he had come to know and love the Yugoslavs. From the moment Hitler had invaded Poland they had hoped their country would be spared the horrors of war. At the same time they had no love for Germany and despised the Italians. The ordinary people of the country had tried to save the honour of their country, but did not reckon on the Cabinet which betrayed them. They were ashamed and depressed at the betrayal.

People had spoken to him since he had come to South Africa as a refugee and asked if the stories about German atrocities were true. They seemed to think they emanated from the minds of journalists. He assured them that the stories were true. He had first-hand experience of Nazi methods.

Hitler and the Axis would not triumph in the end, said Mr. Sitters, because God would never permit one man to mould nations and peoples of the world to his own desire. Rev. Sitters said he had only touched the fringe of the subject and would welcome the opportunity to give a longer address.

Mr. Leon Burman presided and Rabbi L. Abrahams proposed a vote of thanks to Rev. Sitters.

Stellenbosch Zionist Society.

A very successful meeting of the newly-formed Stellenbosch Zionist Society was held at the Talmud Torah Hall on Sunday evening, August 3rd. Mr. A. Senitzky presided.

Adv. J. Herbstein delivered an eloquent address on the present situation, explaining the implications of the War for the Jewish people and the tasks with which they would be confronted when the War came to an end. Eretz Israel would continue to play a dominant role and the work of redemption had to continue. If there had been difficulties in the past, they were due mainly to the failure of the Jewish people to give adequate support to the Zionist movement. He expressed the hope that there would be a generous response to the forthcoming J.N.F. Campaign.

Mr. J. M. Weinreich congratulated the community on the formation of its Zionist Society and expressed his confidence that it would render most useful Zionist work. One of its immediate responsibilities would be the forthcoming Campaign and he was sure that Stellenbosch would rise to the occasion. The political uncertainties of the hour made a large-scale solution of the Jewish problem even more necessary than ever before.
